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#### A word from the head......

I hope that you all had a good Easter Break. The weather was a bit mixed but hopefully you managed to get out and about. Many parents and children have started to use the field, adventure playground and trim trail after school. As in previous years I am happy for this to happen but must make parents aware that they are responsible for their children's safety and welfare after 3.20pm. All pupils must be supervised by their own parent or by another adult who has been given that responsibility.

The school has swung back into action and the children all seem to be back into their routines. Hopefully you will have received a 'Number Knowledge' card from you child's class teacher this week and we would greatly appreciate your support in helping your children practice a few key facts each day.

This week we have received our allocation of children for Reception 2018. We have once again been allocated 30 places for the new intake. We look forward to welcoming the new families to the school over the coming months.

Over the last 10 days we have had ten live eggs and an incubator in school. We have been watching the chicks hatch from the eggs. The children also enjoyed watching a theatre production of the Hobbit. It was such a great show that we have already booked the company for next year.

#### Late Arrivals and Collections

Parents are reminded that the start of the school day is 8.55am. It is important that your child arrives on time for the start of school. Arriving late is disruptive for the class and your child is missing part of their learning. Arrivals after the register have closed are marked as unauthorised absences. If you do arrive late please enter the school through the reception area, sign your child in and order a lunch if required. There has also been an increasing number of late collections from school. Please ensure that you arrive on time for the end of the school day. Always phone the school before if you are unavoidably detained and state how late you are going to be. It is distressing for your child if they are collected late and we are unable to explain where you are.

Absences from school can be reported at **any** time by calling the school number. There is an option for you to leave a message on our dedicated absence voicemail box.



#### Make every minute count !!!

Attending school every day = 100% attendance

Attending 4.5 days a week = 90% attendance = 4weeks missed per year

Attending 4 days a week = 80% attendance = more than half a term missed per year or 2 full years missed over the course of their school career

Attending 3.5 days a week = 70% attendance = more I than a quarter of the school year missed

An average attendance of 80% or less across a child's school career adds up to missing a whole 2 vears from school.

#### Late to school?

- If your child is **5 minutes late** every day they • will miss three days of learning each year.
- If your child is **15 minutes late** every day they • will miss 2 weeks of learning each year.














Young Tristan, a curious boy who rescues all sorts of objects from the rubbish dump, finds an old Viewmaster in its elaborate box, complete with a set of disks. He finds that these represent the ages of humankind, seen as a cyclical structure in which patterns of growth and decay are repeated. 
