A word from the head......



It seems strange to be writing to you all again when we are not yet all back together as a school community. However, I felt that as we are approaching the end of term that it would be a good time to write a newsletter to you all.

Since the school closed to the majority of pupils on 20th March, yes that's over 3 months ago, we have all been living in the strangest of times. Although it has been a challenge there have certainly been lots of positive things that have come out of this period of adversity.

The school has remained open to children of Keyworkers and those deemed vulnerable since the 20th March. In fact the school remained open throughout the Easter Holiday and May Half-Term and was only closed for the 3 Bank Holidays during this period. The whole school staff have done a brilliant job of pulling together to ensure that we have been able to do this — and for that, I will be forever grateful. They have fulfilled their roles with professionalism and humour and have managed the demands placed on them in their capacity as an employee of the school alongside managing the demands of their own families.

I know how hard this period of partial school closure will have been for yourselves and I would like to take this opportunity to once again thank you for all the hard work that you have put into working with your children as 'Home Educators'. Your support is much appreciated and it will, without doubt, have ensured that your children have continued to progress with their learning. Thank you!

The DfE Confirmed late on Friday that schools will not be expected to remain open during the Summer for Keyworker or Vulnerable Pupils. Therefore the school will officially close to all pupils on Friday 17th July 2020. As yet we have not been provided with official guidance from the DfE as to when and how schools will re-open to pupils in September. The Government have clearly stated that schools will be open to ALL pupils in September. We have started to make preliminary plans to allow this happen and eagerly await the next set of guidance, which is due on 30th June. Once we have received the guidance and processed it's contents I will write to you again with an update.

In addition to the 3 Keyworker/Vulnerable Pupil Groups, we have had pupils from R, Y1 & Y6 in school on a two day a week basis. Last week we welcomed the Y2 pupils back to school to join us for their 'Touch Base Day". I hope they enjoyed their time in school; we certainly enjoyed seeing them! We look forward to seeing Y3 this week and then Y4 & Y5 during the last two weeks of term.

On Friday 3rd July you will receive your child's annual report. This year we will be sending the report to you by email.

Evie Lowicki Scales Everest!!!

Evie from Y4 climbed the entire height of Mount Everest using her stairs at home in order to raise money for Sue Ryder Hospice.

Evie set herself the challenge of climbing her stairs more than 3,800 times to reach the 8,848-metre summit – the highest point on Earth. She reached the summit of Everest on May 15.

It took her 16 days, 58,070 steps, 3,781 flights of stairs and 29,029 feet of climbing to achieve her incredible goal. And in order to make the experience as realistic as possible, when Evie reached the height of Everest Base Camp on Saturday, May 9, she started sleeping in a tent at night.

Her charity challenge has raised £1,010 for Sue Ryder Leckhampton Court Hospice.
